WOMEN'S HISTORY - CHAIRWOMAN CLAUDIA MAIDENBURG

History is not what happens. History is what we Teach

For most of time history is written by the men in power and is focused on what men did in war, politics, diplomacy and government. What is valued by men determines what is historically important. If a woman played any part, the history that is taught often eliminates our contribution or describes it within the sex stereotypical roles of wives, mothers, daughters and mistresses.

Taught history often minimizes or ignores the contributions of women and efforts to correct the record are called historical revisionism rather than "truth".

One way that gives people confidence and enables them to strive to contribute comes from the perspective we gain when studying who did what in the past. Limiting what is taught about the contributions of women to our society gives the impression to our young women that making your mark is too difficult and won't be valued anyway. It also gives support to our young men in any belief they may have that they are the only ones who can do great things.

Some key moments in women's history include the suffrage movement, which fought for women's right to vote; the feminist movement of the 1960s and 1970s, which brought attention to issues such as reproductive rights and workplace discrimination; and the #MeToo movement, which has drawn attention to the prevalence of sexual harassment and assault. In those movements that supported our ability to be respected as valued and contributing members of society success came from the cooperation among unrelated women working together for their common good.

Are you on a school board? Do you participate in school related parent organizations? Can to talk to those who are boards or in parent organizations? Does your club have education related projects? Saying yes to any of those questions means you have the power to impact what is taught. That means you can influence what history says and what will happen in the future.

All of us are role models for our families, our Club sisters and our communities. All of our Clubs do something to support education. Our efforts can include being a part of what is taught in our schools and behavior that reinforces the valuable lesson that cooperation and support among women is the only way to ensure we will ever have equal rights, privileges and power.

The goal of the GFWC Signature Program is to increase awareness of and help prevent the widespread occurrence of domestic and sexual violence abuse in communities across the nation. The Signature Program has eight areas of focus:

Campus Sexual Assault

Campus sexual assault is any type of sexual contact or behavior that occurs on a school campus without the explicit consent of the recipient.

Child Abuse

Child abuse includes all types of abuse and neglect of a child under the age of 18 by a parent, caregiver, or another person in a custodial role that results in harm, potential for harm, or threat of harm to a child.

Elder Abuse

Abuse later in life includes the physical, sexual, or psychological abuse, neglect, financial exploitation, or stalking of an adult age 50 years or older.

Human Trafficking for Sexual Purposes

Sexual human trafficking is any act that has been induced by recruitment, harboring, transporting, provision, obtaining, patronizing, or soliciting of a person for purposes of a sex act in which anything of value is given to or received by any person.

Intimate Partner Violence

Intimate partner violence (IPV) includes physical, sexual, or emotional abuse, as well as sexual coercion and stalking by a current or former intimate partner. An intimate partner is a person with whom a person has or had a close personal or sexual relationship.

Military Sexual Assault

Military sexual assault is the use of force, threats, intimidation, or abuse of authority during intentional sexual contact. It also includes instances where the survivor is unable to consent. Survivors of military sexual assault include both men and women.

Teen Dating Violence

Teen dating violence (TDV)—also called intimate relationship violence or intimate partner violence among adolescents or adolescent relationship abuse—includes physical, psychological, or sexual abuse; harassment; or stalking of any person ages 12 to 18 in the context of a past or present romantic or consensual relationship

Violence Against Native American Women

American Indian and Alaska Native (AIAN) women and two-spirit people in tribal communities are disproportionately affected by sexual and gender-based violence in the United States. Research and advocacy have brought attention to the unique nature of victimization in our AIAN communities.

LEADS: Leadership - Education - and - Development - Seminar

The seminar is held annually in conjunction with the GFWC International Convention. One attendee from each State Federation will attend. The purpose is to encourage and train club members to accept leadership opportunities at all levels of Federation.

GFWC covers a portion of the attendees' expenses, including:

Round-trip travel to and from the GFWC Convention city*

One-half of room charge for two nights at official Convention hotel*

Breakfast and lunch during the LEADS program

Discounted Convention meal charges

CFWC will cover registration and additionally underwrite a portion of the Attendees' portion of expenses. **SGVD** budgets towards expenses for the LEADS candidate to attend the CFWC February State Board meeting.

Criteria for Application for LEADS:

- 1. Demonstrates leadership capabilities at the club level as an active Officer or chairperson.
- 2. Exhibits a commitment to Federation.
- 3. Exhibits an understanding of the GFWC mission of community service,

illustrated by programs/projects in which she has been involved.

4. Demonstrates leadership skills, including but not limited to the following

(describe these in the narrative form) organized, responsible, trustworthy, enthusiastic, and flexible.

- 5. Exhibits an interest and willingness to pursue higher leadership positions in Federation.
- 6. Agrees to share information gained from participating in LEADS with others in our State.
- 7. Understands and accepts potential expenses involved in participation.
- 8. Has **not** held elected positions at or beyond the State level.
- 9. Has **not** attended a previous LEADS program.

This District will select one candidate and submit the application to State. The State will choose one (1) candidate to attend the LEADS seminar at the GFWC Annual International Convention. If selected by our District, you will be invited to attend a mini seminar provided by our State (CFWC) Federation at the February State Board meeting. Your attendance is encouraged.

Deadline: All Applications due by November 8, 2024 (District Board Meeting). Submit APPLICATION FORM, <u>six (6) copies</u>, along with <u>club letter of support</u>, <u>plus two (2) letters of support</u> from active GFWC members. <u>DO NOT SUBMIT THE</u> <u>APPLICATION TO ANYONE AT STATE FEDERTION (as directed)</u>. Only submit to SGVD LEADS Chairperson who will send the appropriate application to STATE. The LEADS application form is available on the GFWC website – **gfwc.org/LEADS**. Information is also available in the GFWC Club Manual. LEADS application is also in SGVD Yearbook.

Purpose of minutes

The purpose of corporate minutes is to protect your nonprofit by maintaining an accurate and complete record of its actions, and to protect the corporations directors by demonstrating that they met their fiduciary obligations in the decision-making process.

Must Haves:



Club Yearbook~Officers duties, ByLaws, Standing rules District Yearbook Robert's Rules of Order 12th edition

On minutes:



A location, date, start and end time, type of meeting, presence of quorum, attachments in numerical order of agenda. Names and titles of officers. Guest names and titles, attachments of approved. Exact wording of each motion, who made the motion, voting results. As minutes are a recording of what happened, they are in the past tense. Use: announced, reported, etc. Club or District Logo Footer page numbers Topic spacing

Preparations

Meeting agenda 24 hours in advance with extra space for notes. List of Officers with titles for roll call. Template~ may be the agenda with blank spaces Reports of officers, committees, speeches before or after. Filled out motion forms.
