We were not distracted and yet the amount to be done seems impossible and we feel frustrated. Using the “rule of reappraisal” we can look back and break down all that we did into the many pieces that a big project entails. List all the details of the project that you did indeed complete. Did you make progress? Did you outline the next steps for your future work? Did you send those necessary emails or make those calls? Did you find out something that was missing that needed a different perspective? All of those things are accomplishments that lead to the success of your day, your week, your month and the completion of the project at hand.

Tomorrow is a new day. Be thankful for what you were able to accomplish and let that give you the sense of accomplishment that motivates you to continue on.







Life is so Much Better When we all Know What We are Doing—The Agenda

We are all old enough to know that making a plan and following it helps life run more smoothly. We understand the concept of balancing work and play and know how business often takes up more time than we planned. This rule applies to meetings and Roberts created a format to follow.

Remember the concept that if you don't use it, you will lose it. An agenda follows that rule. If meetings take a rambling road, change that by starting with the adoption of the agenda. If you have an individual Rambler, someone says Point of Order, states the Agenda/established procedure is not being followed and the Chair gets the group back on task. This is where the Chair earns their big buck salary because many ramblers don't think they are rambling.

The business part of the meeting has an established format to allow members an equal opportunity to express their views and the group can make the necessary decisions to carry out their business. Besides allowing members to go out to a well-deserved lunch after the timely ending of the meeting, this is the reason behind stopping the rambling.

The established order for the business of the meeting is:

- Reading and approval of the minutes
 - With those new-fangled computers we generally get “draft” minutes ahead of time. This means the minutes don't have to be read at the meetings.
 - Unless there is disagreement minutes are generally approved by consent.
 - Someone who objects to the minutes must state the reason why.
 - Minutes are not official until voted on/accepted by the members.
- Reports from officers, boards and standing committees
 - The Chair plans in advance who/what will be presented.
 - When an officer makes a report and a motion is needed, another member has the task of making the motion.
 - For standing committees or boards the presenter makes any needed motion and it does not require a second because a group of people (the committee/board) has really made that motion.
 - If a report does not make recommendations, the Chair simply thanks the presenter.
- Reports from special committees
- Special orders such as it is time for Bylaws to be review or nominations etc.
- Unfinished or old business
- New business

Let's make a pact to use Club board meetings to plan and organize the meeting and establish an agenda and to follow it.

WOMEN'S HISTORY & RESOURCE CENTER

I often write about Inez Milholland Boissevain, a suffragist, labor lawyer, and public speaker who influenced the women's movement. In 1916, after having spent weeks traveling the country by train speaking on women's suffrage, Inez arrived in California to ask the women to support the nationwide suffrage movement. Although totally exhausted and in failing health, Inez had tea with Phoebe Apperson Hearst (a CFWC clubwoman) in Northern California and then traveled to Los Angeles. From her podium at Blanchard Hall Inez collapsed. On November 25, 1916, after a stay at the Good Samaritan Hospital, Inez died from pernicious anemia. Today, this is a treatable disease, back then it was not.

If you have been in the hospital in the last few years, like me, I was amazed at all the advances that have taken place over the years and how fortunate I was to survive a deadly illness, unlike Inez whose life was cut short because there was little known about her disease. Were it not for the advances in medicine and the role that women have played in yet another critical field, many of us in our District might not have lived to volunteer yet another day.

The professionalization of medicine primarily began in the early 19th century but there was an effort to keep untrained women (midwives) out of medicine. Our women persisted. In 1849 Elizabeth Blackwell became the first female doctor in America, and she founded the New York Infirmary for Women and Children.

During the Civil War the United States Sanitary Commission handled most of the medical and nursing care of the Union armies. Dorothea Dix, serving as the Commission's Superintendent, was able to convince the medical corps of the value of women working in hospitals. Over 20,000 women volunteered.

Clara Barton also gained fame for her nursing work during the Civil War. She established the American Red Cross. A little known fact, Clara Barton was an honorary member of the New York Sorosis Club.

In the late 19th century, the General Federation of Women's Clubs began supporting nursing scholarships, helped build nursing schools and hospitals and encouraged members to volunteer at facilities. How many clubs today donate their time and money to the medical profession? *Send me an email with your name, club and how your club volunteers. The first five to contact me will be rewarded.*

Other important women in the medical profession include:

Rebecca Lee Crumpler: The first African American doctor who cared for freed slaves.

Eleanor Roosevelt: A GFWC member, had a significant impact on worldwide health care. She believed healthcare was a fundamental right.

Rosalyn Yalow: A Noble Prize winner in Medicine developed a technique making it possible to scan blood for infectious diseases, like HIV/AIDS or hepatitis.

Clara Burdette, 1st President of CFWC, served as President of the Pasadena Hospital Association and donated to and built the Pasadena Maternity Hospital.

Also, did you know that in 1919 GFWC created the Overseas Service Unit and sent 100 young women to Europe to assist soldiers in the aftermath of World War I.

How many of you have doctors, nurses, and medical staff in your club? Why not honor them during Women’s History Month? Write an article about them for your newsletter comparing how it was then and how it is now.

On a humorous note, my last stay at Pomona Valley Medical Center I was able to make just such a comparison. My life’s experience has always been with female nurses. When I arrived at Pomona Valley ER, I noticed how things had changed. Nurses are allowed to wear matching tee shirts and slacks. At Pomona ER the emergency room staff dress in black V-neck tees and jeans. A large majority of the ER nurses and assistants are male. Over two shifts I was assigned 4 male nurses and aids – all dressed in tight black tees and jeans – I thought I was hallucinating and was at an “all male review”. Boy were they something to see! They were knowledgeable, kind and very efficient and I was in such bad condition, they had to do everything for me. One brought me a potty chair and I had to ask him to wipe by butt! OMG. Boy, have things changed.

But what remains constant is the support our clubs provide in the health field. From the 1880’s to 2021CFWC has made a difference and we can be thankful that we live in an era where lives are saved daily, and professions are becoming more and more inclusive. The last 21 months has been a challenging time for all of us, but what has remained constant has been the women and men and support staff in the medical field who have given their all to help us survive the pandemic.
