We can't get Anything Accomplished or How to Stop Harmful Disruptions

At our summer meeting of officers and Committee Chairs several members asked what can be done when members disrupt a meeting. Of course, Robert has rules for that situation.

A good first step is to carefully construct your agenda to establish the content of your meeting.

The agenda should be formally adopted at the start of the meeting. This allows the Chair to stop members who inappropriately violate the agenda.

Let's say someone regularly does things that prevent the assembly from conducting business:

- Any member may say: "point of order" or "I call the member to order". The person who was speaking must sit down and the Chair asks the member to state his point of order or their objection.
- After listening to the reasons, the Chair rules ("well taken" or "not well taken") states the reason for the ruling and ensures this is recorded in the minutes
- If the ruling was "well taken" the member that was found to be out of order cannot continue speaking without a vote of the assembly. If put to a vote it is usually best to put the question as an affirmative vote. Depending on the ruling of the Chair the motion can be worded: "Those of the opinion that the point is well taken say aye." "Those of the opinion that the point is not well taken say aye." (23:12-21)

Every rule can be a two-edged sword. Members can overuse “point of order” to prevent the group from doing anything. Robert has a way to deal with that as well.

The Chair can do what is called Naming the Offender. The Chair directs the Recording Secretary to take down the objectionable words or behavior with the member’s name. Any member can move to order a penalty, or the Chair can first ask, “What penalty shall be imposed on the member?” A motion (not debatable or amendable) offered can propose that the offender be required to make an apology, be censured, be required to leave the hall for the remainder of the meeting or until she is prepared to apologize. The offending member can be required to leave during the consideration of the penalty AFTER they are allowed to present a brief defense. Passage requires a majority vote. (61:12-16)

If the offending member refuses to leave a mass meeting, any person who attempts to disrupt the proceeding in a manner obviously hostile to the announced purpose of the meeting can be treated as a nonmember. The Chair can appoint a committee or sergeant-at-arms to escort the offender to the door or may ask that the police are called. (61:18-21)

Today, I am suggesting documenting fun stories, embarrassing incidents (with permission), unusual or exciting happenings, little known stories from the past, things that have never been put to writing and a history that future members will enjoy reading in another 10 years.

Covina Woman's Club has occasionally done this, and I thought I would share a story with you. This incident was written by member Jean Adair; however, I have taken the liberty to add information because the story was about me (Kim).

Jean: In years past Covina Woman's Club had a huge Christmas Boutique. It was held the Friday and Saturday after Thanksgiving. Crafters started setting up that Monday afternoon and by Wednesday evening it looked like a Christmas wonderland. It had been lovely and warm for a few days, and we were looking forward to good weather for the boutique. Thanksgiving Day had been nice but starting late that night the clouds began rolling in and by morning it was a full-blown thunder and lightning storm with high cold winds.

Kim: Selecting my clothes to wear for the day, I dressed (not for the weather – I don't "do" rain) in a semi-Christmas outfit with cute shoes. I chose to wear my favorite hair piece. It was my long braids pulled together in a ponytail. They were somewhat outlandish for the time and my age.

Around noon someone volunteered to brave the storm and do a lunch run. A few minutes after they left, we got a phone call that all the Boutique signs up and down San Jose and Badillo were either blown down or gone. Everyone was frantic. Without our signs people would not know we were open. So of course, a couple of club members came to the rescue.

Kim: Carol Sauer (former member) was the Committee Chair so she decided she would go out in the rain and put the signs back up. Unfortunately, Carol asked me to go with her. I am also a person who never says No. So off we went.

Jean: Kim Plater and Carol Sauer got a couple of black trash bags and cut holes in them for their chest and arms and used smaller bags for their heads. They put them on and away they went to find our signs and put them back up. About half an hour later they returned soaked to the skin and freezing. They took off the bags and went to stand by our wall heater to try to get dry and warm up. The heater puts out lots of heat and Kim had been standing with her back side up against it for a while. When she felt that she might be dry she walked away from the heater and the room went silent. No one knew what to say or do.

Kim: I was concerned that the curl would not stay in my braids since it was wet. so I reached behind my head, preening and primping to get ready for our big event. Something felt very hot and there was a noxious smell behind me.

Jean: The back of Kim's hair looked like she had stuck her finger in an electric outlet. Her hair was singed and sticking out every which way. As most of you know Kim has many hair pieces to give herself different looks and some are not real hair. She went to the lady's room to look at her hair and when she came out even though she was so embarrassed all she said was "Durn, that was my favorite hair piece. All is well that ends well and the next day the sun came out and we had lots of customers and Kim wore a new set of braids.

Kim: I never did find another set of braids like those but to this day I still wear hairpieces and am very careful where I stand. Of course, the story was all over the club by the next day.






