

Proofread with Care


Be sure to have someone proofread the minutes for you so that all names are spelled correctly, the correct date of the meeting is recorded, and that your minutes read clearly.

Spell out acronyms the first time they're used. Remember that the notes may be reviewed by others for whom the acronyms are unfamiliar. Stay consistent in headings, punctuation, and formatting. The minutes should be professional.

Distribute Broadly

Once approved, email minutes to the full board — not just the attendees — for review. Your minutes will help keep those who were absent apprised of important actions and decisions.


At the start of the next meeting, call for the approval of the minutes. Note any revisions. Try to work out the agreed-upon changes in the meeting so that you don't spend a huge amount of time on revisions. Ask for a motion to approve the minutes with the agreed-upon changes. Once an attendee offers a motion, ask for another person in the meeting to "second" the motion. They say, "All approved." Always ask if there is anyone who does not approve. Assuming not, then say: "The minutes from our last meeting are approved once the agreed-upon changes have been made."

Bells, Giant, Majestic Trees, White Lines, and Women's Clubs"

You may rightfully ask, what do these four items have in common? Well, let me tell you a personal story. My husband and I recently drove to Oregon and during our return drive along the Redwood Highway, along Highway One and 101, and on into Carmel By the Sea to view the Carmel Mission, we both witnessed actual evidence of just three of the many contributions to the good life that have been made by so many members of our Federation of Women's Clubs.



First of all, there's the survival of the majestic redwoods and the giant sequoias. Much is owed to the efforts of our Federation of Women's Clubs to protect these wonderful giants, a gift to all from nature, ensuring the life of these trees for posterity and future generations.

California Federation Women's Clubs Grove Second, there are those 550 historic "mission bells" from Los Angeles to San Francisco that commemorate the Camino Real (the King's Highway) all along Highway 101. In 1906 it was Mrs. A. S.C. Forest and members of the California Federation of Women's Clubs who made the installation of these bells a reality.



Third, there's the white dividing lines that we all take for granted. We have Dr. June McCarroll and her Indio Women's Club's members to thank for the dividing lines. One day, in 1917, the good doctor was driving to her office near Indio, California. Suddenly a truck forced her off the undivided, no dividing line highway. As Dr. McCarroll recalled years later: "My Model T Ford and I found ourselves face to face with a huge truck on the paved, undivided highway. It did not take me long to choose between a sandy berth to the right and a ten-ton truck to the left! Then I had my idea of a white line painted down the center of highways and roads as a safety measure." Because the local elected officials decided to ignore her idea, she took a paint brush, cans of white paint, and painted a very, very long white long to divide the nearby highway. Joined by her fellow Indio Women's Club's members and linking with other women's clubs throughout California, they succeeded in 1924 in having the California Legislature require white lines to be painted along all highways and roads in the state.

What a pleasure it was to announce the award recipients for the Environment Program Area. You should all be very proud of yourselves for the work you to Reduce-Reuse-Recycle. Even during a pandemic, you continued doing your part to take care of and preserve our planet.

Here are some of the projects that were reported in our SGVD reports...

- 1. Recycling of plastic bottles and ink cartridges, funds generated were used to purchase school supplies for foster kids.
- 2. Support of Heifer International with a monetary donation which was tripled by them to support Honey Bee Hives.
- 3. Donations of used coffee cups to Corky's restaurants so those cups would not be tossed into landfills.
- 4. Donations of blankets, towels, etc. to a local Humane Society to be used in the kennels of animals.
- 5. Bring your own cups to club general meetings and district meetings.
- 6. Support of a Friendship Garden of a Garden club
- 7. Arbor Day donation
- 8. Participating in Nature Walks and Tours
- 9. Creation of a Monarch Butterfly Garden and other pollinators.
- 10.Recycling of Clothing and household items with those donations being given to a local Epilepsy Foundation.
- 11. Donation to a Marine Mammal Care Center.
- 12. Penny Pines Donations.

From our CFWC Environment Chairman, Jane Thomey. In her message she described several projects that other clubs are doing throughout California.

Marina District clubs collect plastic bottle caps to be repurposed into Buddy Benches that are intended to take a stance against childhood loneliness.

The melted bottle caps the GFWC Mira Mesa Woman's Club collects provide income that is donated to a Puerta Vallarta hospital.

The Los Cerritos District participates in a RubbermaidCorp sponsored recycle program.

Several clubs donate mascara wands to the Wildlife refuge. They are used to clean away oil, larvae, fly eggs, mites and other contaminants from rescued animals.

These are only a few of the many worthwhile projects that she mentioned.

In the most recent GFWC News & Notes, GFWC Karen Martinek, Environment Community Service Program Chairman reported this information, National Geographic states that since the invention of plastics in the 1950's, approximately 8.3 billion tons of plastic has been produced. Of that plastic, only 9% has been recycled.

As we celebrate Earth Day, here are some of her suggestions to eliminate plastic on beaches, roads, and rivers.

- 1. Go plogging (picking up trash while you are jogging)
- 2. Plan roadside and beach cleanups to keep plastics out of sewers and oceans.
- 3. Participate in ocean cleanups or donate to them.
- 4. Clean plastics from rivers to keep plastics from dumping into the oceans.
- 5. *Upcycle your plastic bags and plastic bottles.
- *Upcycling, also known as creative reuse, such as taking a stack of old newspapers and fold them to create a biodegradable flower pot.

- 6. Support banning single use plastics, such as straws.7. Join a plastics' recycle program, such as with these companies, Trex or Terracycle.

Phoebe Apperson Hurst was extremely active with the GFWC and CFWC and was an active member of the Baha'i faith. She was also the mother to William Randolph Hurst, newspaper magnet and president of the Friday Morning Club in Los Angeles.


The celebration of the 100th anniversary of women obtaining the right to vote has officially been extended to 2021, due to the pandemic.

Julia Ward Howe, President of the founder and later President of the New England Club and the Century Club in San Francisco wrote the Battle Hymn of the Republic.

Past CFWC President Toby Kahan in 2000 was appointed the chair for the California Federation and led a campaign, Libraries 2000. This was a GFWC Project to raise money for libraries. She raised over \$1 million dollars.

On June 9, 1909, Alice Huyler Ramsey (1887 – 1983) and three female friends began a 3,800-mile journey from Hell's Gate in Manhattan, New York to San Francisco, in a Maxwell 30 touring car. It took 59 days. She was the first woman to accomplish this feat. Alice was the only one who knew how to drive a car (she was 22 years old). Alice later moved to Covina and was a member of the Covina Woman's Club. She was honored by the American Automobile Association for her accomplishment.
