Record Votes

The primary purpose of minutes is to record any votes a board or organization takes. Solid record-keeping requires mentioning which participant makes a motion, what the motion states verbatim, and which participant seconds the motion.

For example, "Vice President Cindy Jacobsen made a motion to dedicate 50 percent, or \$50,000, of the proceeds from the ZZZ Foundation gift to the CCC scholarship fund. President Roger McGowan seconded the motion."

This vote tabulation should be expressed in neutral language as well: "The Board voted unanimously to amend the charter in the following way," or "The decision to provide \$1,000 to the tree-planting effort passed 4 to 1. Most Boards try to get a vote passed unanimously. Sometimes in order to help the Board attain a more cohesive outcome, a Board member may abstain from voting: *The motion passed 17 to 1 with one abstention.*

Last month I discussed a few protocol issues for members attending a meeting. This month I will point out protocol for the presiding officer. First and foremost, Be On Time for your meeting. That means you need to arrive 15 to 30 minutes prior to the scheduled start time. You need that time to organize your notes, set out any pertinent material, and confer with speakers so that everyone is prepared to begin. It isn't fair to your members if they are all there on time and you aren't ready to call the meeting to order. Respect the members' time. They may have other commitments for later that will require them to leave if the meeting runs too long because it was late starting. Do not hold up starting the meeting because someone hasn't arrived yet. That sets a precedent, and they'll only start coming later and later. Once the meeting is in session, it is the presiding officer's duty to control the flow of information. If a member is speaking and another person interrupts to make a comment, it is the presiding officer's duty to declare that the remarks are out of order and state that the former speaker still has the floor. Remind everyone that they must wait to be recognized before speaking.

Most of us already know that during the COVID lockdown, being cooped up in one's home without anyone to visit is driving us crazy. According to the NO MORE BLOG "Domestic violence is all about power and control, and in an isolated environment, control is more easily exerted by abusers, with fewer and fewer avenues for accountability for their actions." The article cautious us to be mindful of our surrounds and "if you know or suspect that somebody suffers from domestic violence, please contact them, and keep that vital line of support open."

During my search on Domestic Violence, the BLOG website provided a quick escape feature, the feature is in an orange circular bubble, that tells the reader to press the "ESC" key to quickly escape from the site. The wording is as follows "[PRESS "ESC" TO QUICK ESCAP A new tab will open and this page will redirect to Google.]" The key also has a hidden link, so when it is hit, the page immediately disappears.

To my amazement, the ESC key worked, I also learned that the link within the page gives the reader the ability to immediately remove any researched information that lead the viewer to inquire about Domestic Violence resources. I hope that you will keep your eyes and ears open if there is someone in need of a listening ear.

Education is the Key to a Full Life—the Pathway for our Youth

I encourage all our clubs to collaborate with their local high schools, the local American Legion Post and the American Legion Auxiliary Unit to participate in the Annual California American Legion Auxiliary Girls' State Program and the Annual California American Legion Boys' State Programs. All American Legion Posts and Auxiliary Units are listed in your local telephone directory and online via Google or Safari.

Both aforementioned youth leadership programs began in the 1930's during the Great Depression and are designed to train high-achieving 11th-grade young women and young men to be future leaders. After an interview process, students are selected as Delegates. Each high school can send one Girl Delegate and up to five Boy Delegates.

Prior to our COVID pandemic, every year over 500 11th grade girls from all over California would undergo leadership training for an entire week at Claremont-Mckenna College. Over 1200 11th grade boys would do the same for one week at CSU, Sacramento and would even visit our state capitol and meet with the California Assembly and Senate Members and, on occasion even meet with the Governor.

Endometriosis (en-doe-me-tree-O-sis) is an often painful disorder in which tissue similar to the tissue that normally lines the inside of your uterus — the endometrium grows outside your uterus. Endometriosis most commonly involves your ovaries, fallopian tubes and the tissue lining your pelvis. Rarely, endometrial tissue may spread beyond pelvic organs.

With endometriosis, the endometrial-like tissue acts as endometrial tissue would - it thickens, breaks down and bleeds with each menstrual cycle. But because this tissue has no way to exit your body, it becomes trapped. When endometriosis involves the ovaries, cysts called endometriomas may form. Surrounding tissue can become irritated, eventually developing scar tissue and adhesions - abnormal bands of fibrous tissue that can cause pelvic tissues and organs to stick to each other. Endometriosis can cause pain - sometimes severe especially during menstrual periods. Fertility problems also may develop. Fortunately, effective treatments are available courtesy of MayoClinic.org

ZUCCHINI NOODLES WITH CHICKEN, SPINACH AND PARMESAN

- 3 boneless skinless chicken
- 4 tablespoons avocado oil, divided
- 1 tsp garlic powder
- 1 tsp dried basil
- 1 tsp dried parsley
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 1 tsp dried rosemary salt and pepper, to taste
- 3 large zucchini, spiralized
- 2 cloves garlic, minced 4 cups baby spinach
- 1/4 cup shredded parmesan
- cheese

- 1- Preheat your oven to 425 ° F.
- 2- Place the chicken breasts in a baking dish and coat both sides with 2 tablespoons of the avocado oil. Sprinkle the dried garlic, other herbs and salt and pepper on both sides of the chicken. Cook the chicken for 20-30 minutes or until a digital thermometer reaches 165 ° F. Remove the chicken from the oven, let sit for 2-3 minutes, then dice it up.
- 3- Heat 2 tablespoons of avocado oil in a large sauté pan on medium heat. Add the minced garlic and stir for 30 seconds. Then add the baby spinach and stir until it's wilted down, about 3-4 minutes
- 4- Once all of the spinach has wilted down, add the zucchini noodles and diced chicken. Stir together for 1-2 minutes.
- 5- Add a portion of the zucchini noodles to plate and sprinkle with fresh parmesan cheese and cracked black pepper.

POLICY & LEGISLATION

The Difference between Policy and Legislation

Key Difference: A policy is a document that outlines what a government is going to do and what it can achieve for the society as a whole. It also outlines any and all methods and principles that the government or any entity, for that matter, will use to achieve its directive. Legislation is another term meaning statutory law. These laws have been enacted by a legislature or the governing body of a country. Legislation can also mean the process of making the law.

Policies and legislations are an important aspect of a society; these ensure that a person know how to act in a society. It also regulates and ensures that everyone follows the rules and law that should be followed. These laws are made to treat every person as equal and so that no person can consider himself above the law based on his social standing. Policies and legislations are similar in nature and because of this they are often confused; however, they have distinct differences.

A policy is a document that outlines what a government is going to do and what it can achieve for the society as a whole. It also outlines any and all methods and principles that the government or any entity, for that matter, will use to achieve its directive. Essentially, a policy sets out the goals and planned activities of an entity, whereas a law may be needed to pass to enable government to put in place the necessary institutional and legal frameworks to achieve their aims as set out in the policy. A policy is an informal document that just lists and states what must be done and what is intended to be done in the future.

Women's History Month

Women's History Month had its origins as a national celebration in 1981 when Congress passed Pub. L. 97-28 which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982 as "Women's History Week." Throughout the next five years, Congress continued to pass joint resolutions designating a week in March as "Women's History Week." In 1987 after being petitioned by the National Women's History Project, Congress passed Pub. L. 100-9 which designated the month of March 1987 as "Women's History Month." Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1995, presidents have issued a series of annual proclamations designating the month of March as "Women's History Month." These proclamations celebrate the contributions women have made to the United States and recognize the specific achievements women have made over the course of American history in a variety of fields.

One of my favorite California Federation women is Clara Bradley Baker Wheeler Burdette. (Just her name alone fascinated me at first sight.) Clara was an American clubwoman and philanthropist based in Pasadena, California. She was the first president of the California Federation of Women's Clubs. (1900-1902). I often write and talk about her but in addition to all she did for the California Federation of Women's Club, did you know that: Clara was a founder, second president, and life member of the Ebell Club in Los Angeles; She was director of the Southwest Museum (most of us from Southern California have been there), and the Pasadena Humane Society. After suffrage was gained, she was an organizer of the national League of Women Voters and the Women's Legislative Council of California. During World War I, she was involved with flood conservation in California, and was California field secretary for the Council of National Defense. In 1926, she was awarded an honorary doctorate from Syracuse University. Clara was also active in her community and played an active role in the building of the Woman's Hospital in Pasadena and she built the Ebell Club in Los Angeles.

What does CFWC's first President (1900-1902) Clara Burdette, tuberculosis, the year 1945, the Canyon Woman's Club of Orange County, cancer, CFWC Past President Toby Kahan and the City of Hope have in common?

During the 1880's <u>tuberculosis</u> was a concern worldwide. It impacted everyone's life, including Clara Burdette's. In1876 Clara married Nathaniel Milman Wheeler who suffered from TB. In1885 they moved to Los Angeles in the hope of improving his health in a drier climate.

Eventually, a movement to house and quarantine TB sufferers in areas around the southern California foothills became popular. Unfortunately, "Milman" died before the facilities were built. A few years later, suffering from ill health herself Clara moved to Duarte and lived in a small "home" in hopes of improving her health. Duarte was known during those years as a fresh-air community. After 14 months, Clara returned to Pasadena and became active in civic organizations including the Ebell Club in Los Angeles. Under her leadership clubs expanded their mission to address such community issues as tuberculosis. In 1907 CFWC adopted this resolution: "To endorse all endeavors toward education of the public for the prevention and cure of tuberculosis and the establishment of a state sanatoria." By 1910 clubs developed "health sections" that addressed "open air schools" and TB. These are the same "Health" sections we have today.

During the same era, the Jewish Consumptive Relief Association was chartered with the intent of raising money to establish a free sanatorium in Duarte. Its nickname was the "City of Hope."

In 1945, with tuberculosis becoming less prevalent, the sanatorium was transformed into a medical center. It formally changed its name to City of Hope National Medical Center. It continues to expand and is best known for its cancer research and treatment programs.

Just as community health issues were changing, in 1939, CFWC President Mrs. Thomas Richards appointed a cancer chairman at the State level. By 1945 \$3,000 was donated to the American Cancer Society and a cancer hospital. In 1961, CFWC encouraged clubs to support GFWC's "Pap Smear Project" for the detection of uterine cancer. The Canyon Women's Club in Orange County was the first in the nation to report that 100% of its members had had the Pap Smear Test. In 1971 clubs were encouraged to become involved with their community health centers and with cancer research. They donated "gifts" to the City of Hope under the leadership of CFWC President Mrs. Paul J. Turkis. Today clubs continue their support of cancer awareness and in 2016 CFWC President Toby Kahan selected cancer research and the City of Hope as her President's Project. Toby said, "every single one of us has been touched by cancer. Many of us have lost a loved one, some of us are battling the disease, and all of us hope for a cure. I chose City of Hope Research Center because of the work they are doing to treat cancer patients

and more importantly to find a cure. I encourage CFWC to support City of Hope during this administration." (References: Wikipedia, CFWC History Highlights, Becoming Citizens)

Our Federation assume that all of us know what the multitude of initials we use stand for. Here is a reminder for those new to the organization.

GFWC: General Federation of Woman's Clubs, our headquarters located in Washington, D.C.

WHRC: Women's History and Resource Center, located at our headquarters. It is also a "reporting category" for year end reports that contains information about a club's support for women's history projects.

ILTS: Incoming Leaders Training Seminar, focuses on introducing incoming Regional Presidents, State Presidents, and State Directors of Junior Clubs to the resources available to them from GFWC.

LEADS: Leadership, Education And Development Seminar, is a National and State Federation Leadership program intended to identify GFWC members at the grass-roots level who have the potential and the desire to assume leadership positions in GFWC beyond their club. The LEADS program is held annually the day before the official opening of the GFWC Annual Convention.

WSR: Western States Region – States are divided into 8 regions. California and 10 other states are in WSR.

CFWC: California Federation of Women's Clubs – Every state has a State Federation.


