

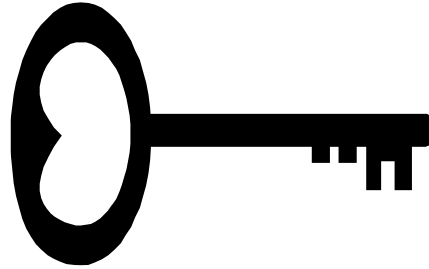

My 1st VP Report to the State Board:

28 Clubs, and over 1200 Members in 500 square miles, Sunland and Downey from the West, to Diamond Bar and La Verne on the East, we are a Diverse, multi cultured, Enthusiastic group of dedicated active Women.

Here is what we did in 2019

1: 2019 was the 100 anniversaries of The Right of Women in the United States to vote, women are gaining in business and in government positions.

2: Advocates for Children Committee, started off with a quote from President John Fitzgerald Kennedy: "Children are the world's most valuable resource and the world's best hope for the future." Child safety, child abuse, Foster care, 18-year Old's out of Foster care, Drug Danger, Human Trafficking, 50 projects \$4876.00 donated and untold lives saved.

3: Domestic Violence brought out the tissue. The kidnapping, torture and murder of a fellow member of two clubs and her husband, the jury finally reached their verdict after five years. We need to continue to support the Legislation and Public Committee to bring awareness to these events in our own backyard.

4: Education and Community Service scored high with all the clubs. Over \$140,000 dollars raised for scholarships, this will allow many students the college of their choice. Literacy and Education was a top priority for every club. Libraries, mentorship programs with the Chamber of Commerce.

5: Remembrance Stars for Veterans, Historical committees formed to preserve our heritage, clean up days for community centers.

6: Christmas Baskets programs for families in need, provided 520 boxes of food public issues community service encourage students and citizens to volunteer in the safety of biking and walking.

7: Fundraising is always needed, and the District Fashion Show fit the need. Almost \$4000 dollars was raised, and baskets sold.

8: Music Scholarship, Art and Photography contest raising interest. Leadership Programs throughout the year offers members the chance to sharpen their skills in parliamentary procedures.

9: The International Outreach Program reached new highs, when one person started to beat that drum and others joined in, and Great Work was the result.

In closing, I stand before all you wonderful ladies that make up this state and I am amazed, once again, at all you have done in 2019.

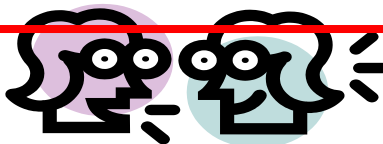

“Little Book Houses” and BACA”

Everyone acknowledges the importance of literacy throughout one’s lifetime, beginning at an early age and ever after. Literacy requires access to textual materials, to books newspapers, magazines, and more and more over the Internet.

One school district has developed a unique approach to promoting literacy. It’s the El Monte City School District (a K-8 school district with 14 schools.) The district has schools in El Monte, South El Monte, Temple City, and Arcadia. The school district and a local non-profit organization, the El Monte Promise, both contacted the local Carpenters’ Union and asked its members if they would be willing to construct a series of small “bird-house-like” “Book Houses.” The carpenters readily agreed, supplied all the necessary materials, the wood, the screws, the nails, the paint, and the labor to build “Book Houses.” Fixed atop a wooden post, each brightly painted “Book House” has been placed in front of each of the 14 school district’s schools, in front of a number of local businesses and non-profit organizations and even in front of several private residences.

Each “Book House” contains a collection of books of all genres and for readers of all ages. Each Book House bears this sign: “Free Books—Take One and Replace one.” Since its beginning, this promotion of literacy has proven to be quite effective and has had a notable effect on literacy in the schools. The public overall has enthusiastically responded with books taken out and replaced on a regular basis. There has been a continuous request for more Book Houses.

The El Monte School District, the El Monte Promise, and the local Carpenters’ Union certainly deserve kudos for promoting literacy throughout the community.



“BACA—Bikers Against Child Abuse”

BACA is a volunteer organization of motor cyclists who come to the aid of abused children. The acronym BACA expands to Bikers Against Child Abuse—Keepers of the Children. It is a common occurrence that abused children are afraid to appear in court to confront their abuser(s). This is where the BACA members come in. A squad of these tough-looking, burly, “mean-looking” muscular, brawny, men and stern-looking female bikers visit the home of an abused child victim and in the presence of the parent(s) confer with the abused child. Nearly always, a bond is immediately formed between the child and the bikers, who invite the child to go for a motorcycle ride with the bikers’ squad. The child is informed that the new friends will accompany the child to court as personal bodyguards. This agreed, then the follow up occurs. The biker squad members, with the child strategically placed between them, march confidently together into the courtroom. The abuser(s), upon seeing this parade, is daunted. The abused child is at ease and willingly gives testimony.

**A Look Back In Time
The First Women's Rights Convention
Seneca Falls, N. Y.
1848**

During the summer of 1848 at the Stanton home near Seneca Falls, Elizabeth Stanton and her friend, Lucretia Mott plan the First Women's Rights Convention.

The two equal rights activists met eight years earlier in London at the first World Anti-Slavery Conference in London. The purpose of the convention was to better organize and unite international abolitionist forces in the fight for emancipation. Although both women were U. S. delegates, upon arrival at the convention they were turned away, barred from the convention floor and forced to the gallery. Their treatment at the convention had a profound impact on Elizabeth and Lucretia and it led them to begin their own movement for women's rights.

Ironically, while championing the freedom of black slaves, the convention reinforced a different type of subordination—that of a woman to a man. Elizabeth Stanton wrote, *“my experience at the World's Antislavery Convention, all I had read of the legal status of women, and the oppression I saw everywhere, together swept across my soul, intensified now by many personal experiences”*.

At Stanton's home, the two women, working with Martha Wright, Mary Ann McClintock and Jane Hunt conceived the format and specific messages for the convention. These five women were declaring the need for equality between sexes. They sent out a call for a women's conference to be held in Seneca Falls. The local newspaper ran an announcement stating the first day would be exclusively for women who were earnestly invited to attend. The public was invited to attend on the second day and about 40 men, including the famous African American abolitionist, Frederick Douglass did attend and participate.

The Declaration of Sentiments Was Born

On July 19th, 200 women gathered at the Wesleyan Chapel and Elizabeth Cady Stanton read the “Declaration of Sentiments and Grievances,” which she, aided by Lucretia Mott, had drafted over the previous few days. She modeled the declaration closely on the Declaration of Independence and its preamble featured the proclamation, *“We hold these truths to be self-evident: that all men and women are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights....”* The Declaration then detailed injustices inflicted upon women in the United States and called upon U.S. women to organize and petition for their rights.

On the second day of the convention, the Declaration was adopted and signed by the assembly. The Declaration was signed by 100 of the attendees, 68 women and 32 men. The convention also passed 12 resolutions—11 unanimously—which called for specific equal rights for women. The 9th resolution, (*“it is the duty of women of this country to secure their sacred right to the elective franchise”*) met with strong opposition. After a lengthy debate with Stanton, Douglass sided with her and the resolution was passed.

Because women were proclaiming a women's right to vote, the entire convention was subjected to public ridicule and some backers of women's rights withdrew their support. HOWEVER, the resolution marked the beginning of the women's suffrage movement in America. Two weeks later, the Seneca Falls Convention was followed by an even larger meeting in Rochester, N.Y. From then on, national women's rights conventions were held annually, providing an important focus for the growing women's suffrage movement. More than 70 years of continuous struggles, the 19th Amendment was adopted in 1920, granting American women the constitutionally protected right to vote.

Women's history tells us that the fight for women's rights truly began on those fateful days in London, as the women were rejected as man's equal in an ironic discussion of freedom and human.

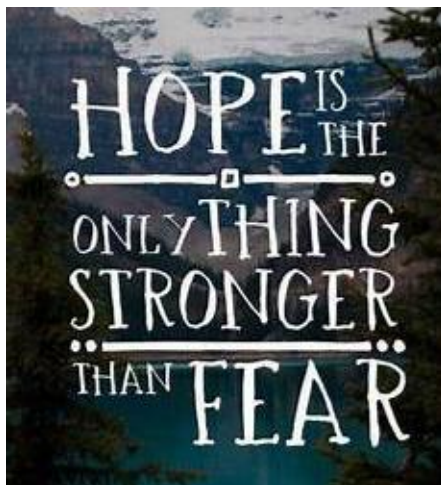
