He coached sports for all the time we were together, and we were married for 46 years. Guess you could say he inspired me to help and give to others.

I joined our club GFWC Federated East Valley Woman's Club in February of 2021, and being a member has meant a lot because I get to bond with Women who have been in Federation for quite some time. I'm able to share in some of their experiences. Including the fact that some of us have lost our spouses, so that in itself allow us to share what we're going through and can relate!

I enjoy attending the district meetings and have made friends with members from other clubs as well. Also reading the District Newsletter is informative on what is going on outside or our own club.

Our Club participated this past Christmas with hosting a Santa's workshop where classes of 2nd graders from local schools got to shop for a loved one that cares for them. They didn't have to pay for any of the gifts as they were all donated previously. Seeing their little faces light up when they got to pick gifts for their loved ones and having it gift wrapped warmed my heart. It was definitely very touching to see, and I look forward to doing it again this year!

COVID and 2020 left a mark on me that I will never forget as it took my husband and changed my life forever. It made my worst nightmare a reality that I still have trouble accepting.


