

All is Well When People Play Nice

Have you ever noticed that when others listen to us, focus on the issue, don't make value judgements and are polite everyone involved seems to get along much better? The same is true in a meeting. In a meeting we add to these basic interpersonal essentials by using titles rather than names and addressing all issues to the Chair rather than individual members. Treating others, the way you want to be treated. Roberts has rules for everything and the rules for interrupting others go a long way to accomplishing the multiple goals of creating a structure where members of the group are given an equal opportunity to express their views, are treated with respect by all and the group can make the necessary decisions to carry out their business.

Sometimes you may need to interrupt a speaker to protect your rights or the rights of the members. The most typically used procedures for this are:

When Someone is Already Talking and you Don't Require a Second

- Point of Information allows you to ask a clarifying question
- Call for the Orders of the Day is used when the item someone is talking about is not on the agenda or is being talked about in the wrong order *without permission from the Chair*.
- Point of Order to object to a procedure and state what rule is being violated
- Parliamentary Inquiry to ask about the rule that applies to the current situation


Objection to Consideration of the Question

- Motion to Reconsider when someone who voted for the motion want the question to be readdressed by the group.
- Motion to Reconsider and Enter on the Minutes when the issue was discussed and voted on after some
 members have left the meeting. This allows time for those who left the meeting to be informed and to
 allow the whole group to readdress the issue at the next meeting.


When Members have Decided to Have Their Own Conversation and it Creates a Disturbance



Current Legislation From Susan Rubio

Children/Families

SB 860 (Author) It will expand the eligibility of the Young Child Tax Credit (YCTC) from \$1 earning to \$0 to include in-home caregivers without paid work. Senator Rubio introduced a similar bill, SB 691, last year. Governor Gavin Newsom's January proposed budget highlighted the need for this expansion.

SB 934 (Author) California Pediatric Cancer Research Fund Act. Would create a \$50 million pediatric cancer research fund for the treatment and prevention of childhood cancers.

SB 70 (Author) Mandatory Kindergarten: It will require all students to complete one year in kindergarten before entering first grade to ensure children are prepared socially and academically before entering elementary school.

Clean Energy

SB 560 (Author) It will create a targeted financial program, administered by the California Energy Commission, to assist low-income households who want to replace outdated household appliances, such as

water heaters, stoves, home heating and cooling systems, refrigerators, and washers and dryers, with low-carbon appliances.

Consumer Protection

SB 1040 (Author) Insurance: Restitution. Would give the Insurance Commissioner the ability to order restitution to consumers from unlicensed sellers of insurance who are breaking California laws, leading to greater repayments to consumers. It would help consumers victimized by insurance scams, including the illegal "we are trying to reach you about your car's extended warranty" robo-calls.

Domestic Violence

<u>SB 1081 (Author)</u> Revenge Porn. Increases protections of victims of revenge porn by expanding the definition of "distribution" and defining what an "identifiable person" means within the statute. Existing law provides no justice to a victim who discovers intimate images publicly displayed without consent, because "display" is not included in the definition of "distribution." The bill strengthens <u>legislation Senator</u> Rubio passed in 2021.

SB 914 (Author) Homeless domestic violence survivors and data systems: local and state support and guidelines. This bill would require the California Interagency Council on Homelessness to set and measure progress toward goals to prevent and end homelessness among domestic violence survivors and their children and among unaccompanied women in California.

SB 935 (Author) Domestic violence: protective orders. This bill would specify a party may request those orders be renewed, subject to termination, modification, or subsequent renewal, as specified.

<u>SR 65 (Author)</u> Teen Dating Violence Awareness and Prevention Resolution. Recognizes that the Legislature continues to support teens who have experienced violence in relationships. It also intends to spread awareness about teen dating violence and how to prevent it by teaching youths what safe and healthy relationships look like.

Did You Know?

Madam C.J. Walker (born Sarah Breedlove; December 23, 1867 – May 25, 1919) was an African American entrepreneur, philanthropist, and political and social activist. She was orphaned at age 7 and received a short education through the teachings from her church.

Walker made her fortune by developing and marketing a line of cosmetics and hair care products for black women through the business she founded, Madam C. J. Walker Manufacturing Company. After experiencing problems with hair loss and talking with her brothers, who were barbers, Madam Walker developed a formula that healed scalp infections. This inspired her to start her own line of hair-care products to reduce dandruff, grow longer hair, smooth hair, or prevent baldness. She was quite the entrepreneur. Her company trained and employed at least twenty thousand door-to-door saleswomen from all over the United States and the Caribbean to introduce and sell her product line.

As her fortune and fame grew, Madam Walker became a noted philanthropist and Black-rights advocate, as well. She was beloved within her community for expanding the local black YMCA, by donating \$1,000 for a new building, and funding scholarships for Tuskegee Institute and Daytona Normal Institute for Girls. She also became a patron of the arts in the early years of the Harlem Renaissance.

Villa Lewaro, Walker's lavish estate in Irvington, New York, served as a social gathering place for the African American community. At the time of her death, she was considered the wealthiest African American businesswoman and wealthiest self-made Black woman in America. Her name was a version of "Mrs. Charles Joseph Walker," after her third husband.

Profits from her business significantly impacted Walker's contributions to her political and philanthropic interests. In 1918, the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs (NACWC) honored Walker for making the largest individual contribution to help preserve Frederick Douglass's Anacostia house. Before her death in 1919, Walker pledged \$5,000 (the equivalent of about \$77,700 in 2019) to the NAACP's anti-lynching fund. At the time, it was the largest gift from an individual that the NAACP had ever received. Walker bequeathed nearly \$100,000 to



orphanages, institutions, and individuals; her will directed two-thirds of future net profits of her estate to charity.
